

Please analyze the following in **complete sentences**. Do not write an essay, but simply type the question and respond with your answer and related supporting details. Make your answers short and specific. Provide textual evidence with page numbers if needed.

- 1. Why do you think the author told this story in verse form? Do you think that was an effective choice for the plot? How so?
- 2. Did your mindset about immigrants change at all after reading Jude's story? How did it change, and why do you think the story affected you? Try to be as specific as possible.
- 3. How was the idea of "hope" portrayed throughout the story? Give specific examples.
- 4. Compare and contrast Jude's life in the U.S. and in Syria.
- 5. What do you think is the most important lesson one can learn from this novel? How can you relate this lesson to our world today?
- 6. Would you recommend this book? Why or why not?
